

Creating a barley consensus map with LPmerge Jeffrey Endelman

LPmerge uses linear programming to create a consensus map by merging linkage maps from different populations. LPmerge depends on the R package Rglpk, which provides an interface to the GNU Linear Programming Kit. Package Rglpk (available on CRAN) must be installed prior to using LPmerge.

To illustrate the use of LPmerge, I will merge a set of 6 barley linkage maps published by Muñoz-Amatriaín et al. (2011) and which can be freely downloaded from

I copied the maps for populations HA, HO, MB, OWBH, SM1, and MH from the Excel file and saved each one as a .csv file. The following code reads in each file and pulls out the markers from chromosome 4H, creating a list with 6 data frames, one for each population.

The lengths of the linkage maps range from 100 to 141 cM, with a mean of 125:

The following code loads the LPmerge package and calculates consensus maps for $K = 1$ to 4, where K is the maximum interval size (see the reference manual or journal publication).

The first part of the output provides statistics on the number of markers, number of consensus bins, and the initial number of ordinal constraints. If there are inconsistencies in marker order between the linkage maps, LPmerge removes ordinal constraints to resolve these conflicts and prints the deleted constraints to the screen. In this example, two inequalities, one from HA and one from HO, were deleted. When multiple markers are listed on one side of the inequality, this indicates that all of them co-segregate in one consensus map bin. The list of deleted inequalities can be used to re-examine the linkage maps or genotype data to better understand the source of the marker conflict.

The second part of the output shows the RMSE between each map and the consensus map, along with the mean and sd RMSE, as a function of the max.interval parameter. The length of each consensus map is also printed. In this example, the $K = 2$ consensus map had the lowest mean and sd for RMSE, and its length was the most similar to the mean of the component linkage maps. A peek at the output for this map looks like

The total error minimized by LPmerge can also use different weights for the linkage maps if some maps are thought to have higher accuracy. For example, one could weight each map by its population size because larger populations produce higher resolution maps:

An examination of this output shows that the $K = 1$ weighted map has even lower mean and sd RMSE compared to the best unweighted consensus map.
